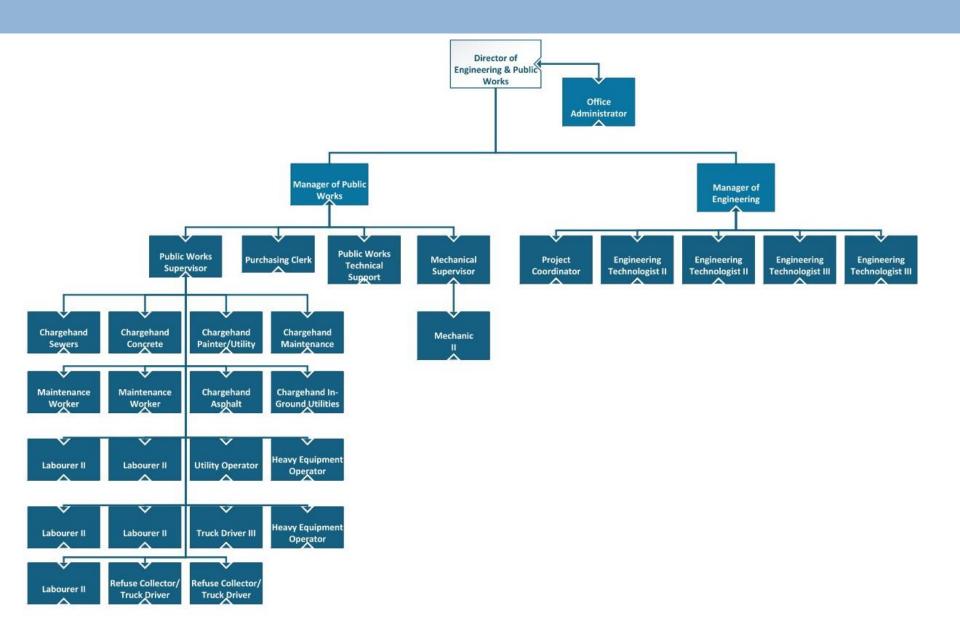


What we do: Engineering & Public Works

The Engineering & Public Works Department is responsible for:

- Infrastructure Management: Roads, sidewalks, drainage, sewers, street lighting, traffic signals, structures, facilities
- Transportation: Traffic management, signage, road permits, active transportation infrastructure
- Operations & Maintenance: Preventive and reactive maintenance of municipal assets
- Capital Projects: Design, procurement, engagement, and construction oversight
- **Solid Waste**: Garbage and kitchen scrap collection; yard and garden facility
- Fleet and Equipment: procurement and maintenance of all municipal fleet
- **Development Reviews**: Technical review for development, asset management
- Council Priorities: Implementation of department related priorities

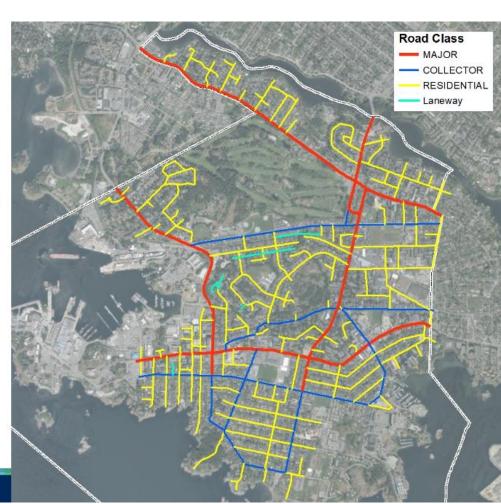


How we do it: Roads

How we do it: Roads

PUBLIC WORKS ROADS MANAGEMENT

- Operations:
 - Pothole repairs
 - Cracksealing
 - Select road base repairs
 - Select full depth asphalt repairs
 - Select mill and overlay
 - Utility cut repairs
 - Line marking renewals
 - Street sweeping
 - Snow and ice removal
- Capital:
 - Large scale road renewals through rebuilds and milling and overlaying

ENGINEERING ROADS MANAGEMENT

- Capital Projects:
 - Design, engagement, and project management
- Asset Management
 - Asset inventory and condition data
 - Develop and implement asset management plants
- Right-of-Way Management:
 - Road occupancy permits
 - Utility location reviews
- Development Reviews:
 - Review and coordinate offsite works
- Council Priorities:
 - Implement department related Council Priorities

How do we measure success?



How do we measure success?

HOW IS ENGINEERING & PUBLIC WORKS DOING?

- What do the Key Performance Indicators say?
- What are the defined Levels of Service? Are we meeting them?
- How does the department compare to other municipalities?

To better answer these questions, staff hired a consultant, Innova Strategy Group, to complete a 3rd party review of the department

3rd Party Department Review – What did they do?

- Research: reviewed department financials, capital plans, strategy documents (Council Priorities, ATNP, Parking Strategy, Asset Management Plan)
- Engage & Consult: interviewed wide range of staff members to ensure broad perspective
- Review and Compared Current Structure:
 Compared the department to like sized
 départements in other municipalities
- Developed Recommendations: utilizing best practices

3rd Party Department Review – What did they find?

WHAT'S WORKING WELL

- **Service Delivery:** provide good service to the community
- Culture: positive morale, taking pride in work, and striving to make the Township better
- Performance: operating at an above average / high level
- Fleet Management: fleet and equipment are well managed

3rd Party Department Review – What did they find?

WHAT AREAS NEED IMPROVEMENT

- Partial Asset Management Plans: asset management and long-term financial planning are critical
- Maintenance Levels: maintenance of assets is below accepted standards
- **Staff Levels:** at times, the demands overwhelm the department
- Project Management Capacity: limited project management skills within department

3rd Party Department Review – What did they find?

WHAT AREAS NEED IMPROVEMENT

- Operating Funding Underspent: core operating budget planned for maintenance not being fully expended
- Outdated Fees and Charges: not recovering actual costs
- No Performance Benchmarking: metrics for key business functions aren't defined

Next Steps

WHAT DOES ALL THIS MEAN?

- Asset Management: continue to prioritize asset management plans, as identified in Council Priorities
- Workforce Plan

Project Manager: to be proposed in 2026 budget process through use of capital funding

Labourers: utilize unspent operating to hire labourers

Future Update: update plan for future requests starting in 2027

Next Steps

WHAT DOES ALL THIS MEAN?

- Fees and Charges: review and increase fees and charges in 2026
- Performance Benchmarking: as asset management plans become more advanced, explore performance benchmarking at a later date
- Operational Improvements: staff to thoroughly review and prioritize additional operational improvements identified by consultant
