Operational funding structure

- O Municipal. Formula: \$1/capita + 0.07% of taxes. Reindexed in 2020 with updated data. Works out to \$1.64/capita on average (has actually gone down over time)
- O **First Nations.** No fees for membership. Collaboration is focused on projects.
- O Private-sector & institutions (eg. 3 PSIs). \$10,000 per year with options for sponsorships.
- O **Non-profits.** \$2500 per year, with options for partnerships or sponsorships.
- O Chambers of Commerce. Reciprocal memberships.

Our Model



SIPP is a proven effective model for our region

- O **Equitable.** Apples-to-apples formula all jurisdictions to have an equal say alongside larger jurisdictions.
- O **Affordable.** Average municipal investment of \$1.64/capita, SIPP's mandate is among the most cost-efficient in Canada (average: \$9/capita)
- O **Cross-sectoral.** Public, private and third-sector leaders collaborate and work toward solutions and opportunities.
- O **Inclusive.** Indigenous economic reconciliation as an imperative to regional prosperity.









Outcomes to date

- O **Efficiency through Leverage.** For every municipal \$1.00 into operations, leverage \$1.63 of fed/prov/private \$'s into projects.
- O **Rising Economy Taskforce**. Raised over \$8.52M into post-pandemic recovery projects.
- O **ROI.** \$38M annual household "payroll" (~700 jobs) = 57-to-1 over investment & 38-to-1 over total operations.
- O **Indigenous economy.** Raised over \$1M to support this work. Now engaging over 200 youth & 130 entrepreneurs annually.
- O **Peer Recognition.** Many accolades over the years, but most recent: International Economic Development Organization of the Year (IEDC 2025, Bronze Medal)



CURRENT FOCUS

INDIGENOUS TOURISM: ITBC partnership, engagement and events. Juan de Fuca Corridor Project ongoing. Creative Tourism project with Aunty Collective.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT: Regional Youth Conference April 25 & 26 at Songhees Wellness Centre. 200 youth and 50 volunteers, workshop facilitators, elders and leaders from 10 South Island First Nations, Metis Nation and VNFC. 2nd annual conference planned for spring '26. Delivered the 2nd Annual Blue Economy Day Camp in August, engaging 20 youth from 8 South Island Nations in marine stewardship and entrepreneurship.

SONGHEES LABOUR MARKET STUDY: In partnership with Songhees Development Corporation, Royal Roads University and University of Victoria Indigenous Economies Research Cluster. Resource Assessment, Needs Assessment and Market Analysis. Nearing Completion - Template for other Nations.

SOCIAL MEDIA STRATEGY: 1 year term marketing position to grow reach and ensure our story reaches broader audience in the region and beyond.



COMING UP

PROCUREMENT PROJECT: Developing Municipal Indigenous Procurement Workshop with and for local government. Created Federal Procurement Roadmap and Guidebook, Corporate Structure Decision Tree as tools for Indigenous businesses to access procurement opportunities. Exploring Indigenous Business Match program with PSPC.

NEW IPC WEBSITE: Gathering content to bring data visualization map to life, and promote Indigenous businesses and success stories, resources and tools for reconciliation and entrepreneurship, and success stories for businesses, governments and communities. (multiple audiences) Website development underway, to launch March 2026.

INDIGENOUS BUSINESS SUPPORT: South Island Indigenous Business Directory reached over 120 members. Will grow with inclusion in new IPC interactive web platform.

KELP REFORESTATION PILOT PROJECT: Conducting feasibility assessment for a project with South Island First Nation, NIC, and Ocean Seeder Collective to re-establish kelp forests with a youth learning component.





What is The Greater Victoria Possibility Charter?

It's a declaration by signatories from community, business, education and government who are hopeful about our future, committed to making it happen together, and want residents — current and future — to feel a sense of hopefulness and entrepreneurial spirit, while celebrating progress along the way.



Why Do We Need The Possibility Charter?

Greater Victoria is at a crossroads.

For too long, our region has refled heavily on public sector stability. But that stability has also led to complacency. Elevating our need to act is the fact that people are leaving B.C. for other places at levels not seen for 20 years — and most of them are under the age of 40.

We're not broken - but we are stuck.

We face a generational opportunity to reset the story of what our region is and who it's for. We need to diversify our economy and unleash an entrepreneurial "can-do" culture. We need this to be a place where young people see themselves in the region's future, but they need this to be a place where they can afford to live, work, start businesses and families.

Who Signs The Possibility Charter?

This declaration is open to:

- Indigenous governments and organizations
- Community and youth leaders.

What Commitment is Required?

The Possibility Charter is a non-partisan declaration that our region can be a leader in values-driven economic development in Canada and the world if we all commit to working together.

- Local governments commit to continuing policy development to support housing, entrepreneurship and investment in economic development.
- Employers commit to inclusive hiring pipelines and youth mentorship programs.
- Secondary and post-secondary schools commit to programming that will **Increase student attachment to the local economy** and their belief in building their careers here.
- Nonprofits, foundations, and philanthropists commit to investing in youth and young adults, as well as amplifying youth-led initiatives.
- Chambers of commerce and industry and business associations commit to championing new opportunities.
- South Island Prosperity Partnership, the regional economic alliance, commits to stewarding leaders around the goals of the Charter and marking the milestones we achieve together.
